





#### <u>Gorbachev: His Life and Times</u> by William Taubman – NONFICTION BIOGRAPHY Gorbachev; <u>eAudio</u> via hoopla\*


The definitive biography of the transformational world leader by the Pulitzer Prize-winning author of Khrushchev. When Mikhail Gorbachev became the leader of the Soviet Union in 1985, the USSR was one of the world's two superpowers. By 1989, his liberal policies of perestroika and glasnost had permanently transformed Soviet Communism, and had made enemies of radicals on the right and left. By 1990 he, more than anyone else, had ended the Cold War, and in 1991, after barely escaping from a coup attempt, he unintentionally presided over the collapse of

the Soviet Union he had tried to save.




## <u>King: A Life</u> by Jonathan Eig – NONFICTION BIOGRAPHY King; <u>eBook</u> and <u>eAudio</u> via Libby\*

Vividly written and exhaustively researched, this is the first major biography in decades of the civil rights icon Martin Luther King Jr.—and the first to include recently declassified FBI files. 

## Long Walk to Freedom: The Autobiography of Nelson Mandela by Nelson Mandela –






Born in the town of Sighet, Transylvania, Elie Wiesel was a teenager when he and his family were taken from their home in 1944 to the Auschwitz concentration camp, and then to Buchenwald. This book is the terrifying record of Elie Wiesel's memories of the death of his family, the death of his own innocence, and his despair as a deeply observant Jew confronting the absolute evil of man.



#### <u>A Revolution of Love: The Meaning of Mother Teresa</u> by David Scott – NONFICTION BIOGRPAHY TERESA

In this Mother Teresa biography by David Scott, we meet the Mother Teresa that we would never have met simply from television interviews or news images. A complex figure, Mother Teresa found her life's work only after years of false starts and by overcoming great practical difficulties.
